


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New students who begin NAU courses typically complete their first term (receiving a passing grade) as follows:

Graduation Rates

Historically, college graduation rates have been calculated by comparing the number of students who started classes during the fall term to the number of students who graduated during a given time period (*e.g.*, two years, four years, *etc.*). College Navigator, which reports data from the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS), also takes a very traditional approach to calculating graduation rates and includes only first-time, full-time students in its calculations. Unfortunately, these traditional methods of calculating graduation rates do not provide a true picture of NAU's graduation rates, because: (1) the vast majority of NAU's undergraduate students (84%) do not attend full-time; (2) many NAU students have attended other schools prior to enrolling at NAU and, therefore, are not considered first-time students; and (3) because NAU offers monthly start dates, many students start classes at times other than the fall term.
